\$15M in grants will benefit health equity

More than \$15 million in grants intended to improve health equity across the Tulsa area will be announced on Friday, with 40 community organizations set to benefit. Part of Ascension St. John's Health Equity Initiative, the awards will be announced at the health system's inaugural Legacy of Love Luncheon, to be held at the University of Oklahoma-Tulsa's Founders Hall.

Over \$58 million has been awarded in the four years since the initiative launched, with a total of 72 organizations having benefited.

Bo Beaudry, Ascension St. John CEO, said the initiative is an example of how the system's reach extends far beyond the walls of its hospitals and clinics.

"Through the work of our health equity team, we are able to extend our Christ-centered mission to improve the health of our neighbors İn

Stephen Pyle, executive director of The Common Good, said his organization is being awarded a \$2 million three-year grant after previously receiving a \$150,000 grant.

Pyle said the funding boost "will be truly transformational for us. It's going to allow us to think bigger than we've been able to in the past about some of the food and health access issues facing northwest Tulsa and how we can help.
